## End of Session Report 2015 Regular Session

Monday, April 27, 2015

This report covers bills passed by the Washington State Legislature during the 2015 Regular Session (January 12, 2015 – April 24, 2015).

Bills passed by the Legislature are subject to [executive action by the Governor](#).

Unless otherwise noted in the text of the legislation, all bills become effective on July 24, 2015.

**Items marked in bold indicate that the legislation contains a requirement of most/all law enforcement agencies.**

Nothing in this report should be interpreted as legal advice. The 'Short Descriptions' are a brief summary of the most substantive provisions of a bill. Please reference the actual text of legislation.

<a href="#">HB 1059</a> (SB 5033)	Sexually violent predators	Excludes evidence from an expert on a committed sexually violent predator's (SVP) behalf if the committed SVP does not participate in the Department of Social and Health Services' most recent annual review interview and evaluation. Suspends the annual examination requirement while the committed SVP is awaiting trial for unconditional release; if a person is recommitted, the next annual examination must be done within one year of the recommitment order. Defines "treatment" to be the sex offender specific treatment program at the Special Commitment Center or a course of sex offender treatment by a certified provider. Requires a court, prior to authorizing release of a SVP to a less restrictive alternative, to consider release to the person's county of commitment.
<a href="#">SHB 1068</a> (SB 5225)	Sexual assault exam kits	<b>Requires a law enforcement agency, when it receives a sexual assault examination kit, and consent has been given by the victim or the victim's parent or legal guardian to analyze the kit as part of a sexual assault investigation, to submit a request for laboratory examination to the Washington state patrol crime laboratory for prioritization for testing by it or another accredited laboratory that holds an outsourcing agreement with the Washington state patrol. Creates a work group to determine the number</b>

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		<b>of untested sexual assault examination kits and make recommendations regarding strategies for reducing the number of untested sexual assault examination kits in the state. Expires June 30, 2018.</b>
<a href="#">SHB 1069</a> (SB 5253)	DNA work product, preserving	<b>Requires the preservation of deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) work product secured in connection with a felony violent or sex offense to be preserved: throughout the length of the defendant's sentence when the defendant has been convicted in connection with the case; for 99 years or until the death of the defendant when the defendant has been convicted and sentenced to a determinate plus sentence in connection with the case; for 99 years or throughout the period of the statute of limitations when the defendant has been found not guilty in connection with the case; or for 99 years or throughout the period of the statute of limitations in any case where the identity of the perpetrator is not known.</b>
<a href="#">HB 1090</a> (SB 5058)	Finan. fraud, identity theft	Reauthorizes and expands the financial fraud and identity theft crimes investigation and prosecution program.
<a href="#">SHB 1105</a> (SB 5076)	Operating sup budget 2015	Making 2015 supplemental operating appropriations.
<a href="#">HB 1124</a>	Beer and wine sampling	Authorizes certain licensees to provide samples of two ounces or less of beer and wine free of charge for consumption on the premises.
<a href="#">ESHB 1126</a>	Fatality reviews by DEL	Requires the department of early learning to: (1) Convene a child fatality review committee and determine the membership of the review committee; (2) Conduct a child fatality review if a child fatality occurs in an early learning program, a licensed child care center, or a licensed child care home; and (3) Allow the parents or guardians whose child's death is being reviewed to testify before the child fatality review committee.
<a href="#">SHB 1194</a> (SB 5246)	Death benefits/ LEOFF, WSPRS	Provides that, if the surviving spouse or domestic partner of a member of the law enforcement officers' and firefighters' retirement system or the state patrol retirement system who is killed in the course of employment is not eligible to receive industrial insurance payments due to remarriage, the surviving spouse or domestic partner shall receive an amount equal to the benefit they would receive but for the remarriage.
<a href="#">SHB 1240</a> (SB 5908)	Student restraint, isolation	Prohibits schools from physically restraining or isolating a student except when the student's behavior poses an imminent likelihood of serious harm to that student or another person.
<a href="#">2SHB 1281</a>	Sexual exploitation of minor	Assesses a fee, on a person who is convicted of possession of depictions of a minor engaged in sexually explicit conduct, of one thousand dollars for each depiction or image of visual or printed matter that constitutes a separate conviction. Creates the internet crimes against children account.
<a href="#">HB 1282</a>	Driving w/license suspended	Addresses suspended drivers' licenses when the suspension is based on noncompliance with a child support order.
<a href="#">HB 1302</a> (SB 5394)	Child abduction statutes	Amends provisions of the crimes of Custodial Interference in the first and second degree to cover any court order making residential provisions for the child, rather than just court-ordered parenting plans.
<a href="#">SHB 1316</a> (SB 5250)	Arrest without warrant	Authorizes a peace officer to arrest without a warrant and take into custody a person whom the peace officer has probable cause to believe has violated any temporary order for protection granted under chapter 7.40 RCW (injunctions) pursuant to chapter 74.34 RCW (abuse of vulnerable adults).
<a href="#">HB 1342</a>	Cider,	Allows a licensed microbrewery to sell, from its premises for on-premises and

	microbrewery sale of	off-premises consumption, cider produced by a domestic winery.
<a href="#">ESHB 1424</a>	Suicide prevention	Requires the department of health to adopt rules establishing minimum standards for the suicide assessment, treatment, and management training programs, including content specific to veterans and the assessment of issues related to imminent harm via lethal means or self-injurious behaviors. Exempts certified registered nurse anesthetists from the training programs.
<a href="#">ESHB 1440</a>	Cell site simulator devices	Prohibits the state and its political subdivisions, by means of a cell site simulator device, from collecting or using a person's electronic data or metadata without: (1) That person's informed consent; (2) A warrant; or (3) Acting in accordance with a legally recognized exception to the warrant requirements.
<a href="#">E2SHB 1450</a> (E2SSB 5649)	Mental health/inv outpatient	Provides that a person meeting the definition of "in need of assisted outpatient mental health treatment" may be committed by a court for involuntary mental health treatment on a less restrictive alternative to an inpatient order. Identifies the services that an order for less restrictive alternative treatment under the Involuntary Treatment Act (ITA) must and may include. Provides that a court may commit a person for involuntary mental health treatment on a less restrictive alternative order for up to one year, rather than up to 180 days, if the person's previous commitment term was commitment to a state hospital. Reorganizes provisions of the ITA regarding modification and revocation of less restrictive alternative orders and requires courts to consider certain information when deciding whether to revoke or modify less restrictive commitment orders. Identifies mechanisms to enforce compliance with less restrictive alternative orders.
<a href="#">SHB 1480</a> (SB 5338)	Intermittent-use trailers	Allows a registered owner to apply to the department of licensing, a county auditor or other agent, or a subagent appointed by the director of licensing for an intermittent-use trailer license plate for an intermittent-use trailer. Exempts intermittent-use trailers from vehicle registration renewal requirements.
<a href="#">SHB 1564</a> (SSB 5167)	Sale of liquor, prohibition	Establishes that territory annexed into a city after the passage of a liquor prohibition by that city through a public vote is not subject to any liquor prohibition later adopted pursuant to a subsequent election.
<a href="#">HB 1599</a> (SB 5266)	Criminally insane/facilities	Eliminates the expiration of RCW 10.77.091 relating to secure facilities for the criminally insane.
<a href="#">HB 1627</a>	Unlawful land entry/ hunting	Expanding the existing prohibition on unlawfully entering the land of another to hunt or to retrieve hunted wildlife under Title 77 RCW to include entering the land of another to collect wildlife parts.
<a href="#">HB 1637</a> (SB 5290)	Tribes/ prescrip. monitoring	Authorizing law enforcement and prosecutorial officials of federally recognized Indian tribes access to prescription monitoring data.
<a href="#">ESHB 1671</a>	Opioid overdose medications	Authorizes a practitioner to prescribe, dispense, distribute, and deliver an opioid overdose medication: (1) Directly to a person at risk of experiencing an opioid-related overdose; or (2) By collaborative drug therapy agreement, standing order, or protocol to another person who is in a position to assist a person at risk of experiencing an opioid-related overdose. Authorizes a pharmacist to: (1) Dispense an opioid overdose medication pursuant to a prescription; and (2) Administer an opioid overdose medication to a person at

		risk of experiencing an opioid-related overdose.
<a href="#">HB 1674</a> (SB 5663)	Youthful offenders, reentry	Allowing youthful offenders who complete their confinement terms prior to age twenty-one equal access to a full continuum of rehabilitative and reentry services.
<a href="#">SHB 1721</a>	Ambulance patient transport	Requires the department of health, in consultation with the department of social and health services, to convene a work group comprised of members of the steering committee and representatives of ambulance services, firefighters, mental health providers, and chemical dependency treatment programs to establish alternative facility guidelines for the development of protocols, procedures, and applicable training appropriate to the level of emergency medical service provider for the appropriate transport of patients in need of immediate mental health or chemical dependency services. Requires the state health care authority to develop a reimbursement methodology for ambulance services when transporting a medical assistance enrollee to a mental health facility or chemical dependency program.
<a href="#">HB 1779</a>	Victim interviews training	Requires a person conducting a victim interview, as part of the disciplinary process for a health professional alleged to have committed sexual misconduct, to have successfully completed a training program on interviewing victims of sexual misconduct in a manner that minimizes the negative impacts on the victims.
<a href="#">E2SHB 1807</a>	Small business spirits sales	Allows a group of individual retailers authorized to sell spirits for consumption off the licensed premises to, for purposes of negotiating volume discounts, accept delivery of spirits at their individual licensed premises or at any one of the individual licensee's premises, or at a warehouse facility registered with the state liquor control board. Authorizes the state liquor control board to assess a penalty at a rate no higher than one-half percent per month on the balance of an unpaid license issuance fee if a licensee, subject to license issuance fee requirements, fails to submit its quarterly reports or payment to the board. Provides that this act is null and void if appropriations are not approved.
<a href="#">HB 1817</a>	Wheeled all-terrain vehicles	Provides that the release from liability required for any person who operates a wheeled all-terrain vehicle on a public roadway will also release counties, cities, and towns from any liability. Provides that the release of liability must be on a form supplied by the Department of Licensing.
<a href="#">SHB 1898</a>	Child victim testimony	Requires the criminal justice training commission to: (1) Include in its training session on investigating and prosecuting sexual assault cases a reference to the possibility that a court may allow children under the age of fourteen to testify in a room outside the presence of the defendant and the jury; and (2) Annually survey law enforcement and prosecuting agencies regarding, with respect to the preceding year: (a) The frequency of cases where children under the age of fourteen have elected not to testify, including the reasons for the election not to testify; (b) the number of cases where remote testimony was used and whether those cases resulted in conviction; and (c) the total number of child sexual abuse cases referred for prosecution and the number of those cases that were prosecuted.
<a href="#">EHB 1943</a>	Home detention	Redefines home detention to require presence in a private residence 24 hours a day, unless otherwise authorized by the court, and subject to electronic monitoring. Defines electronic monitoring as tracking the location of a person through technology capable of determining a person's presence or absence at a particular location. Prohibits the use of home detention for those offenders

		<p>who have a prior history of knowingly violating the terms of a home detention program. Requires monitoring agencies to notify certain agencies of violations of home detention and verify monitored individuals' locations on a regular basis. Requires private monitoring agencies to have policies for contingency plans and conflicts of interest and meet background check requirements. Subjects private monitoring agencies to civil penalties for noncompliance with the act. Requires the courts to notify the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) when discontinuing or resuming use of a monitoring agency and requires the AOC to transmit this notice to courts statewide. Prohibits a monitoring agency from monitoring an offender who is currently awaiting trial for a violent or sex offense and who has previously been convicted for such an offense. Prohibits an award of credit toward a sentence for time spent in pretrial home detention if an offender is convicted of certain offenses. Provides that a person who knowingly violates the terms of home detention is guilty of Escape in the third degree.</p>
<p><a href="#">ESHB 1980</a> (SB 6020)</p>	<p>Sunshine committee rec's</p>	<p>Implements the sunshine committee's recommendations on exemptions from disclosure with regard to: (1) Certain financial information identifiable to an individual that concerns the amount and conditions of his or her assets, liabilities, or credit including social security numbers; (2) Information relating to enhanced 911 emergency communications systems and emergency notification systems; (3) Information contained in a local or regionally maintained gang database; and (4) Proprietary reports or information obtained by the Washington pollution liability insurance program director in soliciting bids from insurers. Allows participants' names, general locations, and point of contact to be disclosed to other persons who apply for ride-matching services and who need that information in order to identify potential riders or drivers with whom to share rides.</p>
<p><a href="#">HB 2000</a> (SB 5848)</p>	<p>Marijuana agreemnts w/tribes</p>	<p>Authorizing the governor to enter into agreements with federally recognized Indian tribes in the state of Washington concerning marijuana.</p>
<p><a href="#">HB 2181</a></p>	<p>Highway maximum speed limit</p>	<p>Authorizes the secretary of the department of transportation to increase the maximum speed limit on any highway to seventy-five miles per hour.</p>
<p><a href="#">SSB 5004</a></p>	<p>Warrant officers' authority</p>	<p>Authorizes a city, town, or code city to establish the position of warrant officer. The position shall be maintained by the city or town within the city or town police department.</p>
<p><a href="#">SSB 5027</a> (ESHB 1103)</p>	<p>Prescription drug monitoring</p>	<p>Providing access to the prescription drug monitoring database for clinical laboratories.</p>
<p><a href="#">2SSB 5052</a></p>	<p>Cannabis patient protection</p>	<p>Establishes the cannabis patient protection act. Adopts a comprehensive act that uses the regulations in place for the recreational market to provide regulation for the medical use of marijuana. Ensures that patients: (1) Retain their ability to grow their own marijuana for their own medical use; and (2) Have the ability to possess more marijuana-infused products, useable marijuana, and marijuana concentrates than what is available to a nonmedical user. Creates a medical marijuana endorsement to a marijuana retail license to permit a marijuana retailer to sell marijuana for medical use to qualifying patients and designated providers. Establishes a medical marijuana consultant certificate. Requires the department of health to develop recommendations on establishing medical marijuana specialty clinics that would allow for the</p>

		authorization and dispensing of marijuana to patients of health care professionals who work on-site of the clinic. Provides a sales and use tax exemption to qualifying patients on purchases of: (1) Marijuana for medical use when authorized by a health care professional and when purchased at a marijuana retailer with a medical marijuana endorsement; and (2) Marijuana concentrates, useable marijuana, and marijuana-infused products for medical use when qualifying patients hold a valid authorization card. Provides a retail sales and use tax exemption for anyone who purchases low THC, high CBD products. Changes the name of the state liquor control board to the state liquor and cannabis board.
<a href="#">SB 5070</a>	Domestic violence offenders	Requiring the department of corrections to supervise domestic violence offenders who have a conviction and were sentenced for a domestic violence felony offense that was plead and proven.
<a href="#">SB 5100</a>	Rental cars/traffic infrac's	The exception for rented or leased vehicles from the DOL reporting process for unpaid parking, camera, and toll violations is removed. This has the effect of allowing local jurisdictions and WSDOT to report unpaid parking, camera, or toll violations, for which rental car businesses are liable, to DOL for purposes of withholding vehicle registration renewals applicable to the vehicle at issue. Consistent with language found in the automated camera statutes, language is added clarifying that if a rental car business forwards the renter's name and address to the jurisdiction, liability for an unpaid parking infraction transfers to the renter.
<a href="#">SB 5101</a>	Mental status evaluation	Allows, rather than requires, an order requiring mental status evaluation or treatment to be based on a presentence report.
<a href="#">SB 5104</a>	Alcohol, contr sub/sentences	Crime-related prohibitions imposed by the court are defined to include prohibition on the use or possession of alcohol, cannabis, or controlled substances if the court finds that any chemical or substance abuse contributed to the offense. If a court finds that any chemical dependency contributed to the offense, the court may order participation in rehabilitative programs for alcohol, cannabis, or controlled substances as a condition of the sentence regardless of the particular substance that contributed to the offense. The court may impose a prohibition on the use or possession of alcohol, cannabis products, or controlled substances regardless of whether a chemical dependency evaluation is ordered.
<a href="#">SB 5107</a> (HB 1305)	Therapeutic courts	Authorizes, funds, and encourages the establishment of therapeutic courts.
<a href="#">SB 5121</a>	Marijuana research license	Creates a marijuana research license that permits a licensee to produce and possess marijuana for limited research purposes. Authorizes the University of Washington and Washington State University to contract with marijuana research licensees to conduct permitted research. Authorizes the life sciences discovery fund authority to: (1) Review and approve or disapprove marijuana research license applications; and (2) Review reports made by marijuana research licensees under state liquor control board rule and provide the state liquor control board with its determination on whether the research project continues to meet certain research qualifications.
<a href="#">SSB 5154</a>	Reg. sex or kidnap offenders	<b>Establishes new registration procedures for sex and kidnapping offenders and makes other changes and clarifications to sex and kidnapping registration laws. Creates the crime of refusal to provide a DNA sample. Makes multiple changes to the community notification procedures and requirements of public agencies regarding sex and kidnapping offenders.</b>

		<b>Requires the Sex Offender Policy Board to review and make findings on certain issues related to sex and kidnapping offenders and report to the Governor and the Legislature.</b>
<a href="#">ESSB 5158</a>	Call location info/emergency	Requires a wireless telecommunications provider to provide information in its possession concerning the current or most recent location of a telecommunications device and call information of a user of the device when requested by a law enforcement agency. Requires the state emergency management division E911 office to maintain a database containing emergency contact information for all wireless telecommunications providers registered to do business in the state and make the information immediately available upon request to facilitate a request from law enforcement for call location information.
<a href="#">SB 5210</a> (HB 1169)	Life annuity benefit/WSPRS	Allows members of the Washington state patrol retirement system, at the time of retirement, to purchase an optional actuarially equivalent life annuity benefit from the Washington state patrol retirement fund.
<a href="#">2SSB 5215</a>	Internet crime against child	Creates the Washington internet crimes against children account. Requires receipts from legislative appropriations, donations, gifts, grants, and funds from federal or private sources to be deposited into the account. Requires expenditures from the account to be used exclusively by the Washington internet crimes against children task force and its affiliate agencies for combating internet-facilitated crimes against children, promoting education on internet safety to the public and to minors, and rescuing child victims from abuse and exploitation.
<a href="#">E2SSB 5269</a> (EHB 1258)	Detention decision review	Allows an immediate family member, guardian, or conservator of a person to petition the superior court for review of a designated mental health professional's decision, if the designated mental health professional decides not to: (1) Detain a person for evaluation and treatment; or (2) Take action within forty-eight hours of a request for investigation being submitted to the designated mental health professional. Requires the department of social and health services and each regional support network or agency employing designated mental health professionals to publish information in an easily accessible format describing the process for an immediate family member, guardian, or conservator to petition for court review of a detention decision. Provides that this act is null and void if appropriations are not approved.
<a href="#">SSB 5280</a> (HB 1198)	Beer, cider/grocery stores	Authorizes certain grocery store licensees, upon approval by the state liquor control board, to receive an endorsement to permit the sale of beer and cider in a sanitary container brought to the premises by the purchaser, or provided by the licensee or manufacturer, and filled at the tap by the licensee at the time of sale.
<a href="#">SSB 5292</a>	Powdered alcohol	Powdered alcohol is defined to mean any powder or crystalline substance containing alcohol that is produced for direct use or reconstitution. The possession, sale, and use of powdered alcohol is prohibited in Washington and is subject to prosecution as a misdemeanor except for certain bona fide research purposes.
<a href="#">SSB 5299</a> (SHB 1048)	Residential mortgage lending	Updates, clarifies, and strengthens department of financial institutions' enforcement, licensing, and examination statutes relating to residential mortgage lending, and enhances the crime of mortgage fraud in the residential mortgage lending process.
<a href="#">2SSB 5311</a>	<b>Crisis</b>	<b>Requires the criminal justice training commission to provide crisis</b>

<b>(HB 1348)</b>	<b>intervention/ officers</b>	<b>intervention training to new full-time law enforcement officers employed after July 1, 2017, by a general authority Washington law enforcement agency.</b>
<a href="#">ESSB 5346</a>	Personal emer resp services	Requires employees of companies providing personal emergency response services, when requested by first responders during an emergency, to provide the name, address, and other information necessary for first responders to contact their subscribers within the jurisdiction of the emergency.
<a href="#">E2SSB 5353</a>	Distillery spirits marketing	Authorizes certain distilleries to: (1) Serve spirit samples of their own production that are adulterated with nonalcoholic mixers, water, and/or ice; (2) Apply to the state liquor control board for an endorsement to sell spirits of its own production at retail for off-premises consumption at a qualifying farmers market; and (3) Accept orders for spirits from customers and deliver spirits to customers if certain conditions are met. Authorizes the state liquor control board to issue special permits to certain distilleries for an event not open to the general public, including at the licensed premises of the applying distillery, for the purpose of tasting and selling spirits of its own production. Authorizes licensed retailers to sell gift certificates and gift cards intended to be exchanged for consumer goods, including alcohol, produced and sold by the licensee.
<a href="#">SSB 5381 (HB 1731)</a>	Firearms, return by law enf.	<b>Requires law enforcement agencies to: (1) Before returning a privately owned firearm, confirm that the individual to whom the firearm will be returned is the individual from whom the firearm was obtained or an authorized representative of that person and that he or she is eligible to possess a firearm; and (2) Develop a notification protocol that allows a family or household member to use an incident or case number to request to be notified when a law enforcement agency returns a privately owned firearm.</b>
<a href="#">SSB 5438</a>	Bicycle, moped/stop, proceed	Allowing bicycles and mopeds to stop and proceed through traffic control signals under certain conditions.
<a href="#">SB 5482</a>	GPS data disclosure	Exempts from public inspection and copying under the public records act, the global positioning system data that would indicate the location of the residence of an employee or worker of a criminal justice agency.
<a href="#">SSB 5501</a>	Animal cruelty prevention	It is a class 2 civil infraction to leave or confine any animal unattended in a motor vehicle or enclosed space if the animal could be harmed or killed by exposure to excessive heat, cold, lack of ventilation, or lack of necessary water. An animal control officer or law enforcement officer is authorized to enter the motor vehicle or enclosed area to remove the animal from such exposure. The officer or employing agency is not liable for any property damage related to the animal removal. The maximum penalty for a class 2 civil infraction is \$125, plus statutory assessments. The civil infraction does not preclude criminal prosecution for animal cruelty. The crime of animal fighting includes causing a minor to commit the same crime. For the crime of animal fighting, the definition of an animal is no longer limited to just dogs or male chickens. The value limit on a pet animal, the theft of which is subject to a mandatory \$500 fine, is raised from \$250 to \$750, which is the monetary threshold for theft in the third degree. A person in violation of the statute may also be prosecuted for animal cruelty. Animal cruelty in the first degree is committed when a person intentionally inflicts substantial pain, causes physical injury, or kills an animal. The cruelty must be committed by a means

		causing undue suffering or with extreme indifference to life. Animal cruelty also includes causing a minor to inflict substantial pain, cause physical injury, or kill an animal.
<a href="#">SSB 5518</a>	Campus sexual violence	Requires the state board for community and technical colleges to conduct a uniform campus climate assessment of community and technical colleges to gauge the prevalence of sexual assault on community and technical college campuses. Requires institutions of higher education to: (1) Conduct a campus climate assessment to gauge the prevalence of sexual assault on their campuses; (2) Make information available to current and prospective students and employees regarding campus sexual violence confidentiality and reporting requirements; and (3) Refrain from establishing a different disciplinary process on the same campus for a matter of sexual violence, based on the status or characteristics of the student involved in that disciplinary proceeding, including characteristics such as a student's membership on an athletic team, membership in a fraternity or sorority, academic year, or any other characteristics or status of a student.
<a href="#">E2SSB 5564</a> (HB 1481)	Juvenile records and fines	Allows courts to seal juvenile records if the person has paid the full amount of restitution owing to the individual victim named in the restitution order. Eliminates various legal financial obligations and other fees for juveniles, except the DNA collection fee and the victim penalty assessment for most serious offenses and sex offenses. Eliminates interest for legal financial obligations for juveniles. Provides access to sealed juvenile records by criminal justice agencies.
<a href="#">SSB 5593</a>	Healthcare/inmates, detained	<b>Establishes circumstances when a law enforcement agency must accompany a person in their custody while being treated at a hospital. Requires state licensed hospitals to accept payments consistent with the state workers compensation program rate as payment in full.</b>
<a href="#">SSB 5596</a> (HB 1380)	Wine manufacturer sp. permit	Creating a special permit for a manufacturer of wine to hold a private event for the purpose of tasting and selling wine of its own production.

<a href="#">SSB 5719</a>	Campus sexual violence	Requires the student achievement council, the state board for community and technical colleges, the council of presidents, the institutions of higher education, the private independent higher education institutions, state law enforcement, and the attorney general's office to collaborate to carry out certain goals with regard to campus sexual violence. Creates the task force on preventing campus sexual violence to coordinate and implement those goals. Expires July 1, 2017.
<a href="#">ESSB 5884</a>	Trafficking of persons	Designates the office of crime victims advocacy as the single point of contact in state government regarding the trafficking of persons. Creates the Washington state clearinghouse on human trafficking as an information portal to share and coordinate statewide efforts to combat the trafficking of persons. Reestablishes the state task force against the trafficking of persons which will be chaired by the director of the office of crime victims advocacy. Delays, until June 30, 2017, the expiration of the commercially sexually exploited children statewide coordinating committee. Requires establishments that maintain restrooms for use by the public to post, in all restrooms of the establishment, a notice which may be in a variety of languages and include toll-free telephone numbers a person may call for assistance, including numbers for the national human trafficking resource center and the office of crime victims advocacy.
<a href="#">2SSB 5888</a>	Near fatality incidents	Requires the department of social and health services to: (1) Notify the office of the children and family ombuds in the event of a near fatality of a child who is or has been in the care of or receiving child welfare services from the department or a supervising agency within three months preceding the near fatality or who was the subject of an investigation by the department for possible abuse or neglect; (2) Conduct a review of the near fatality; and (3) Conduct a review of a social worker's and his or her supervisor's files and actions taken during an initial report of alleged child abuse or neglect, when certain conditions exist and there is a subsequent allegation of abuse or neglect resulting in a near fatality within one year of the initial allegation that is screened in and open for investigation.
<a href="#">SSB 5889</a> (E2SHB 2060)	Competency eval. timeliness	Addresses performance targets and maximum time limits for the completion of accurate and reliable evaluations of competency to stand trial and admissions for inpatient restoration services related to competency to proceed or stand trial for adult criminal defendants.
<a href="#">SSB 5933</a> (HB 2098)	Human trafficking laws progr	Requires the office of crime victims advocacy to establish a statewide training program on Washington's human trafficking laws for criminal justice personnel.

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Requires the traffic safety commission to convene a pedestrian safety advisory council to review and analyze data related to pedestrian fatalities and serious injuries to identify points at which the transportation system can be improved and to identify patterns in pedestrian fatalities and serious injuries.
